MAYOR'S MESSAGE



Do you know that Bluffdale is part of a south-west valley community center? It opened in the spring of 2011. The center will celebrate

its 12th anniversary in April. I had the opportunity to meet with the director, Shawn Ashby and learn more about the Salt Lake County Senior Center and all that it offers. The senior center is in Riverton but provides support for Bluffdale, Riverton, and Herriman residents.

Here are some interesting facts I learned:

1. The Senior Center is for everyone of all ages.

The programs, meals, activities, and events are available for those 60+ years of age. To make it all happen, the center really needs volunteers of all ages to come and help! The newsletter has a page on ways to volunteer. <https://slco.org/riverton-senior-center/>

2. You can stop in anytime for a tour or just visit. No appointment is needed.

The center opens as early as 7 AM. You can stop by on your way to work to check it out! When I visited, I was shown the ceramics and wood carving studio, the kitchen, dining area, exercise and workout gym, dance and aerobic studio, billiards room (the 3 pool tables are tournament size), lapidary studio (cutting and polishing stones), game room, quilting, a sewing classroom, music classroom, movie theater, library, computer lab classroom and more.

3. I was amazed how many activities, classes, and support opportunities there are at the center.

Each month, the community center posts a calendar and newsletter to their website (we also have a link on Bluffdale.com) to show all the classes and activities. In the newsletter, there are also courses that can be registered for and done at home if you can't make it to the center. If the class includes supplies, the supplies can be picked up from the senior center one week after registering for the class.

The in-person classes are too many

to list. Make sure to look at the calendar and see if any of the classes are interesting to you.

4. You don't have to be signed up for an in-person class to stop by and spend time at the center.

When I went to the center, people were there doing puzzles, working on their own quilts, and community quilts. Others were sitting in the comfortable chairs reading, playing cards, and some were just visiting.

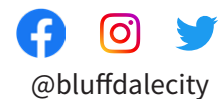

5. Bluffdale has over 1000 people in the age category of 60+.

Currently, only 95 Bluffdale residents have attended, used, or participated at the community center. Most people are coming from Riverton and Herriman.

6. Bluffdale has contributed \$20,000 annually to provide free transportation to and from the center.

Only 1 Bluffdale resident is currently using this service.

7. Lunch is served Monday-Friday from 11:30-12:15. Meals on Wheels is also available.

There is not a charge, but there is a suggested donation of \$4.00 if you are 60+. If you are under 60, the suggested donation is \$8.00. That means you can be a volunteer, go with your parent or grandparent, and eat lunch with them! The daily lunch menu is posted on the website. <https://slco.org/riverton-senior-center/>

8. Health awareness, support and promotion is a big part of the community center.

When reading the newsletter and the calendar (they are different) notice the many health classes being offered. When I toured, there was a classroom full of students learning about tools needed for bladder control. There are also classes for nutrition, dementia, and exercise.

9. Are you a caregiver? There are classes and support for you as well.

The Bowling family, of Bringhurst Station, competed last spring on Survivalists, a BYUtv show. The episode of their journey aired on January 29th. Survivalists game show challenges families in a 4-day trek across rugged terrain to prove they can work together to reach the finish line. Using teamwork, communication, and survival skills, teams race against each other to win the \$10,000 prize. The Bowlings talked with Mayor Natalie Hall and City Manager, Mark Reid about how their experience helped, Wes, and stepdaughter, Victoria, to trust each other and strengthened their relationship. Also, how they are still finding sand almost a year later! We love celebrating big accomplishments with our community members!

MOODY'S CREDIT RATING INCREASE

An independent analysis of Bluffdale City's financial condition was done in January, and we are thrilled to share the news!

Moody's Investors Services (the fixed income debt securities rating company) upgraded Bluffdale City's issuer rating to Aa1 and lease revenue bonds to Aa2. Much like a credit score issued for individuals, this impressive two step increase will save the City an estimated hundreds of thousands of dollars per year in interest. The city started with an issuer rating of Aa3 and lease revenue bonds of Aa2.

Part of the analysis included reviewing the impact of the citizen's referendum on the tax increase. They recognized the long-term negative financial impact this will have on the city. In December 2022, after the revenue reduction (caused from the referendum) the City Council decided to reduce costs instead of using available fund balances when adjusting the FY 2022-2023 budget.

According to Moody's, "a strong available fund balance provides some flexibility to make investments without issuing debt. Financial flexibility and resources will remain instrumental as the city deals with growth related projects and costs associated with increased services."

Moody's report supported the rate increase because of the City's strong available fund balance. Because of continued growth, the city will need to issue bonds to pay for additional infrastructure like the public works building, additional water tanks, and facilities.

Since investors rely heavily on Moody's rating, a high rating means the city can borrow money at much lower interest rates than those cities with poor or low ratings. Now when the city needs to borrow money for a big capital project like a Public Works building, investors will be willing to offer a low interest rate, reducing the cost of our government to Bluffdale residents.

We are excited to have an independent organization like Moody's recognize our city's financial strength. Financial strength cannot be created overnight. It is the result of consistently doing the following: long-term planning, wise budgeting, conservative spending, and sound reporting and oversight. Our elected officials and every member of our city staff play a role in this. We appreciate all their efforts.

DAY RANCH PARK UPDATE

The main infrastructure is in place and we are starting to focus on the amenities. A big milestone happened when the restrooms were installed in February. ONE LANE BRIDGE UPDATE

The project is moving forward steadily. The 14600 South Railroad Crossing Environmental Document was adopted by the City Council on February 8. We have just received comments from Union Pacific on the Type Structure Selection Report; Union Pacific has requested 14 clarifications to the method the City is proposing to build the bridge under the railroad lines. We will be working on responding to all the questions. We are preparing a request for proposal for a Construction Manager/General Contractor to start working with the team to complete the project. 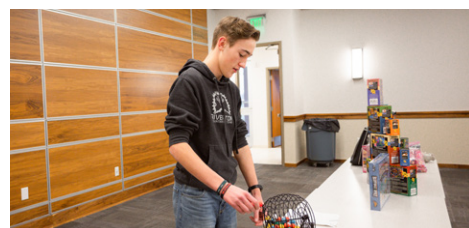
BLUFFDALE YOUTH COUNCIL

CHILDREN'S ENTREPRENEUR FAIR & CHILDREN'S ENTREPRENEUR CLASS



The Children's Entrepreneur Market registration (for the Day Ranch Celebration on August 12th) will open in April-so be watching! This is for youth ages 5-16 years old who reside or attend school in Bluffdale (be aware of the guidelines). The registration fee is \$20. You can read more about the market <https://childrensentrepreneurmarket.com/>

The City of Bluffdale is also excited to partner with 4-H to offer a beginner course that will prepare youth in grades 3 - 12 (notice the ages are different) to start their business. Mayor Natalie Hall will host four, two-hour long workshops to teach youth attendees how to start their own business through finding a need, developing a business plan and budget, producing a product, creating a marketing plan, and more.

Classes will be on Fridays, April 14, April 28, May 5, and May 19 from 3:30-5:30 pm at Bluffdale City Hall (2222 W 14400 S). Class size is limited to 100 students (must be a resident or attend school in Bluffdale). You do not have to participate in the 4-H Entrepreneur course to be a vendor in the market. You do not have to participate in the Children's Entrepreneur Market to take the 4-H course. Those who have completed the 4-H course do have great success with their businesses. One girl in 4-H kept her business going for years, paid for college, and has now passed it to her younger sister.

The cost for the class is \$10 and includes the 4-H membership fee and workbook. At the completion of the course, 20 of the students will receive a \$100 grant to fund their business. Go to <https://www.bluffdale.com/Events> for the registration link.

Another children's entrepreneur opportunity is through the 4-H Bright Ideas contest. This is a platform for youth in grades 6 - 12 (again note the ages) to learn about pitching their business ideas to future investors. Youth need opportunities to internalize motivation from incentivizing environments. The 4-H Bright Ideas contest is designed to teach young people the skills they need to take control of their futures.

Youth participants will be required to upload a video recording by March 25, 2023, of their business pitch. Videos must be less than five minutes. Multiple youth may partner and present together, however only one youth will be awarded the \$1,000, if selected as a winner. If multiple youth plan to partner on the pitch, they must all participate in the video recording. Video uploads may be any style: voice over presentations, video of the actual products, recording of a pitch, etc. Videos will be scored in a preliminary round according to the rubric. Please note points will only be awarded for pitch content. The video quality and editing will not be scored. Ten finalists will be selected by April 1, 2023.

LOCALSCAPES CLASSES



The Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District offers a special outreach class, called Localscapes, that teaches about city landscape standards, free resources, and rebates available to residents as they transition to a water-wise yard. The one-hour class will be taught twice in Bluffdale this spring. The first class is **Saturday, March 25 at 10 am** in the community room at Bluffdale City Hall (2222 West 14400 South). The second class is **Thursday, March 30 at 7 pm** in the community room at Fire Station #92 (14895 Noell Nelson Drive). The class is free and open to all Bluffdale residents. Register at bluffdale.com/events. Class size is limited.

Last year the Utah State Legislature allocated an additional \$5.3 million in funding for water conservation programs available only to residents in cities that adopted the recommended water-efficiency standards; Bluffdale is one of only a handful of cities statewide that qualify for the rebates. The addition of this funding, plus more funds from a federal grant and the Central Utah Water Conservancy District, means that rebate payouts are going up substantially on all projects but especially on full yard renovation of existing landscapes. SALT LAKE COUNTY ANIMAL SERVICES

Salt Lake County Animal Services has some suggestions on How to Greet a Dog safely. When approaching a dog:

- **Step 1:** Make sure the dog has a leash, a collar, and an owner. If it doesn't, call Animal Control.
- **Step 2:** Look at the dog's body language. Look to see if it is a happy/relaxed dog.
- **Step 3:** Ask permission from the Owner: "May I please pet your dog?" It is okay if the owner says "no!"
- **Step 4:** If you have permission, do a quick body language check again.
- **Step 5:** Angle body slightly away from dog.
- **Step 6:** Keep hands to yourself until the dog approaches you, seeking out interaction.

Step 7: Pet the dog calmly and quietly, avoiding sensitive areas.

Step 8: Remain standing if it is a large or medium sized dog. If it is a small dog, you can crouch down, making sure you are still not leaning over the dog.




