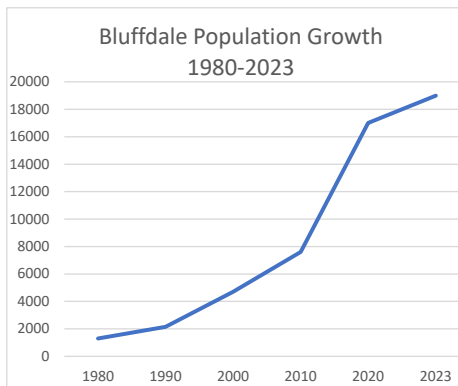
MAYOR'S MESSAGE



October is National Fire Prevention month and Bluffdale is celebrating! Please join us on Monday, October 9th 6:00-8:00

PM at fire station #92 (14895 Noell Nelson Drive) for a family open house. There will be crafts, home made root beer, tours, fire prevention education, trucks on display and question and answer opportunities. On Monday, October 16th there will be an open house at fire station #91 (14350 S 2200 W).

I want to share some history about our fire department as we focus on Fire Prevention Month. Bluffdale was incorporated in 1978 and by



1980 had a population of 1300 residents. We had a volunteer fire department until the year 2001 when we had a population of around 5,000 residents. It was then that our city hired 2 part-time fire fighters to be available for 12-hour shifts Monday-Friday. We still had volunteers during the night and on weekends.

In the year 2004, Bluffdale began paying 2 part-time fire fighters 24-hour coverage for 7 days a week. As of today, we have over 19,000 residents and we still have a part-time fire department.

This time of year, during hunting season, staffing the fire station becomes more of a challenge. Every fire station in the valley has the same challenge. Those with full time fire fighters can mandate overtime. Mandatory overtime from other stations affects us negatively. Fire fighters who have signed up for a Bluffdale shift are pulled from that shift at the last minute and are required to report to their full-time jobs. This leaves us short when we think we were covered, as there is little warning. With fire fighters working overtime shifts and the reduced pool of available fire fighters (due to vacationing/hunting) we end up with unstaffed seats.

Currently we budget for 6 fire fighters per day. Four at station 92 (a medic engine and/or an ambulance) and two at station 91 (a Medic Ambulance).

Our staffing for the 9/4 - 9/17 pay period (14 days) was as follow:

- 1 day fully staffed
- 4 days 1 seat short
- 6 days 2 seats short—Station 91 Closed
- 3 Days 3 seats short—Station 91 Closed, Station 92 short 1 seat

Station 91 was closed 9 of the 14 days. The plan, as put forward by our fire chief (to move toward hiring 6 full time fire fighters this year) and supported with the budget dollars approved by the city council, would have resolved our problem—the problem of being short staffed and having to close a fire station. We have put on hold the hiring of the 6 full-time positions until we know the results of the vote on November 21, 2023.

I want to encourage everyone to go to the open houses this month and talk with Chief Evans and his fire staff. Bring the family to participate in the activities and thank the fire fighters for being willing to pick up extra hours to work in Bluffdale.

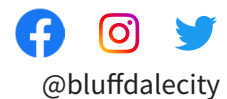

EQUAL PAY ENROLLMENT

Enrollment in Equal Pay for Bluffdale Utility bills will open in October and will begin with the November bill.

Eligibility Requirements:

1. You must be the owner and resident of the home.
2. You must have 12 months of history at the address with no late payments.
3. The bill must be paid in full to begin equal pay (by October 25).
4. Rental accounts do not qualify for equal pay.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

As 2023 winds down, economic development activity continues to flourish around the community. Retail development – primarily restaurants – is often the focus when questions about economic development arise, but you may be surprised to know that commercial flex spaces and industrial developments create a sustainable long term tax revenue source and influence future restaurant locations as well. Developments in projects such as Bringhurst Station on South Redwood Road and Covent Garden, Marble Arch, and Mountain Pointe Industrial off of 14600 South and near HeritageCrest Way not only provide sources of jobs, but produce assessed value increases in real estate.

The City has two Economic Development Areas – Eastern Bluffdale EDA and Jordan Narrows EDA – which were established years ago with the other taxing entities (such as the Jordan School District and Salt Lake County) to create jobs and assessed value growth. Tax increment financing can be

used in these areas to incentivize developments which meet these goals. Most of eastern Bluffdale is in one of these districts and the revenue generated has helped to build roads, utilities, and provide state required moderate income housing funds, among other things. Even the residential growth on the east side of the community provides tax growth to fund economic development projects during the project lifespans. In the City's long term economic development strategy, these commercial and industrial flex projects provide daytime employment which helps to drive lunch traffic to places to eat.

On the restaurant and food front, this year some great news has happened: 'Bout Time Pub and Grub opened, as did Zupas. We have applications in the queue for Swig, Costa Vida, and Rancheritos. Kroger Company – which owns and operates the Smith's brand – has purchased property at Bangerter and Redwood for a grocery store and fuel center; design review is in process. FatCats

has a restaurant inside its cinema and activity complex.

In the service industry some highlights for the year include: Mountain Valley Animal Hospital, WoodSpring Suites hotel, 7-11, and Quick Quack car wash under construction. Holiday Oil has recently pulled a permit for a new convenience store as well. Other notable commercial applications include a large data center near the Point, the mixed-use project The Centrum, and development of a new commercial subdivision north of the Maverik on Redwood Road.

Leads, proposals, ideas and submittals come through the City's Planning, Building, and Economic Development offices regularly. The generation of ideas does ultimately bring investment and places to work, shop, eat, or visit a physician.

Salt Lake County Animal Services is experiencing a dog overpopulation crisis. In the years 2020, 2021, and 2022, Salt Lake County Animal Services took in an average of 192 dogs a month. In the first eight months of 2023, we have taken in an average of 238 dogs a month. THE POINT PROJECT UPDATES

The Point of the Mountain State Land Authority (Land Authority) has announced that demolition of the decades-old prison facilities is nearly complete. State and local leaders marked the momentous occasion on August 30th with the toppling of one of the last guard towers. Within less than a year, work has progressed rapidly to remove nearly all antiquated buildings and structures. The Land Authority has prioritized sustainable practices during demolition. For example, they have recycled 76% of all materials and 100% of the concrete from the old buildings.

“From day one we made a commitment to Utahns that we would conduct our work at The Point in a sustainable manner. Our demolition efforts directly reflect that commitment,” said Alan Matheson, The Point executive director. “Concrete from the old prison buildings is being crushed onsite for use in the foundation of new buildings and to build future roads. We believe that this is not only a sustainable approach to development, but also literally and figuratively transitions the site from a place of constraint into a place of openness, learning, and opportunity.”

Concrete crushing on site has eliminated approximately 160,000 miles of truck traffic, improved air quality, reduced wear and tear on adjacent roads, and lessened the impacts to neighboring communities. In addition, the Land Authority and DFCM have removed invasive species such as the Russian olive tree and ground the trees into mulch for use in dust mitigation. The mulch will also be repurposed for landscaping in the first phase of development.

Costumes

- Use face paint instead of a mask as a mask can block vision.
- Wear light colored costumes or use reflective tape, stickers or glow sticks to help you be visible. Use a light colored candy bag for better visibility.
- Wear shoes that fit to avoid tripping or falling. Ensure your costume isn't too long to create a tripping hazard.

Treats

- Parents should inspect all candy

before children eat any. All opened or tampered with treats should be thrown away. If you see anything suspicious during your celebrations please call 801-794-3970.

Driving

- Don't drink alcohol or use drugs and drive. We need our streets as safe as possible on Halloween night!
- SLOW DOWN and watch for kids.
- If you're driving children around for trick-or-treating, make sure everyone is buckled up appropriately in a car seat, booster or seat belt. Do this every time they enter the car, and check to make sure they're secure before driving to the next stop.
- Put your cell phone down and don't use any other mobile device

while driving. Pull over to safely check voice messages or texts if necessary.

- Be especially alert for trick-or-treaters during the popular trick-or-treating hours of 5:30 - 9:30pm.

Walking

- Trick or Treaters under age 12 should be accompanied by an adult.
- Trick or treat in familiar and well lit areas.
- Kids should never enter any house without an adult.
- Cross the street at intersections using crosswalks where possible.
