MAYOR'S MESSAGE



I have been appointed to sit on the UTA Local Advisory Council as one of nine members. This year, I was nominated to be an officer as the 2nd

Vice-Chair. In 2026, I will be the UTA Advisory Council Chair. We meet once a quarter to discuss projects, funding and the future of transit in Utah. This has been a wonderful opportunity for me to have a voice for transit in the southwest side of the valley. In May, I attended the Transit Academy and had the opportunity to drive a train. I

learned that it is a job that takes skill and a lot of training.

If you visit rideuta.com, you can provide feedback on UTA's 2025 tentative budget (through November 6) and see the transit plan into 2050. In that plan, there is transit coming to Bluffdale. In the next 5 years, there is a plan for a bus route to connect us to other cities on Redwood Road and in the next 10 years, there is a plan for a Front Runner station in Bluffdale.

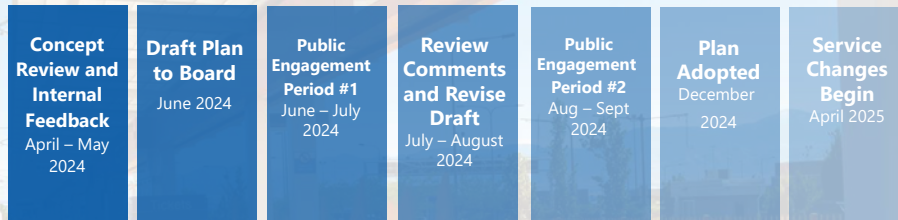
The plan for the Front Runner station is in the area bordering the Point Project. The exact location has not been determined, but we are assuming it will not be too far from the Phillip Gates Memorial Park. Right now, an environmental study



is being conducted and we are in the early planning stages. Parking, roads, privacy and traffic will all be a part of this plan. We hope the station will be open in time for the 2034 Winter Olympics.

As of now, if you would like to connect into the UTA public transit system, you can utilize the UTA On Demand service. Download the app called "UTA on Demand" and book your ride! This is a corner-to-corner service, so you will be picked up and dropped off close to your destination. The cost is \$2.50 per ride. I am grateful to work together with UTA in finding solutions for our residents to have access to public transportation. As always, please reach out to me with any questions.

CODE CORNER

Hello, Bluffdale neighbors! Winter is on its way, and now is a good time to get your homes and yards ready for the colder weather. One important thing to do is to trim the trees in your park strip. The park strip is the space between the sidewalk and the street, and it's a good idea to check that your trees there are trimmed high enough.

Bluffdale's city rules say that these trees should be trimmed 12 feet up from the curb and sidewalk (City Code 7.40.090). When trees hang too low, they can block the sidewalk, making it hard for people to walk safely. By trimming your trees, you're helping everyone enjoy walking around our neighborhoods.

3RD ANNUAL PRIMARY CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL SUPPLY DRIVE

It is hard to believe that this is our third year doing the Primary Children's supply drive. It always amazes me to see our community come together to support this cause. We truly live in the best city!

I started this drive three years ago after my son had two life threatening emergent surgeries followed by long stays in the hospital, and all of this occurred in a four-month period. Our family was so grateful for the care that he had received during his stay but we also were devastated that this had happened to our child. During the second hospital stay I saw myself and my son grow increasingly gloomy. I have always found that providing service to others when things in your own life seem to be down and dark has always been the spark that is needed to improve my outlook. I asked my son what was something he was grateful for during the hospital



stay. He thought for a moment and told me the squishy fidget ball that he used to distract himself from the needles they used to draw his blood. It wasn't anything expensive but to him it was invaluable.

While doing this supply drive I have realized our family's story isn't unique or different from others. I have had so many people in our city share their experiences and gratitude for Primaries with me. Some are stories

of a tiny pre-term baby who spent months in the hospital until they were big enough to go home. Others of broken bones and ruptured appendix. Some of long-term illness that span years if not a lifetime of care. All of these stories despite their outcome have the same feeling of gratitude. Often the gratitude is for the small tender mercies in the form of a toy after a hard procedure, a new shirt to wear instead of a hospital gown, a coloring book and crayons to pass the time, or a fidget toy to distract from a placement of an IV needle. That is the purpose of this supply drive to provide some of those tender mercies for a child receiving care at Primary Children's. Often, it is the small inexpensive things that are the most impactful. I hope you are as excited about this supply drive as we are, and I'm asking for your help to make this our most successful and giving year yet!

HOLIDAY PET SAFETY TIPS

BAD HOLIDAY FOODS FOR YOUR DOG TO AVOID



With the holidays approaching, here are some quick tips on what to keep away from your pet's mouth. Those delicious, rich holiday foods might lead to upset stomachs or, even worse, a trip to the emergency vet.

Avoid giving your pet:

- Candy: Chocolate, especially dark, semi-sweet, and Baker's chocolate, contains theobromine, which is toxic to pets and can be lethal if consumed.
- Fatty leftovers: Drippings and other fatty foods can cause vomiting and diarrhea.
- Bones: Never give your pet leftover holiday bird bones. They can splinter and cause internal injuries or even death.
- Stuffing, pudding, sauces, and foods with onions, grapes, raisins, or pickles.

Some holiday foods can be given to pets in moderation before being prepared with spices. These include sweet potatoes, white potatoes, pumpkin (before adding cream or fat), cranberries, chard, kale, green beans, and a small bite of turkey, ham, or other meats. For more specific guidance, consult your veterinarian.

TRAIN QUIET ZONE UPDATE

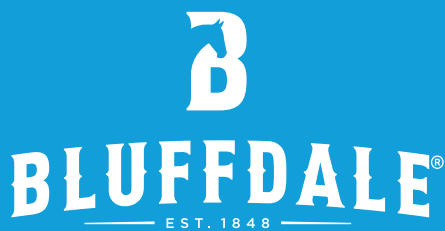
- Have you noticed more train horns lately? The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) regulations mandate that conductors have to sound two long, one short, one long blast pattern at every on grade public crossing, unless a public authority (like a city or county) apply for a quiet zone. The public authority has to show that they have mitigated the increased risk caused by the absence of the horn blast. In other words, that it is safe to not blast the horn at intersections. The cities in Salt Lake and Utah Counties are considered one quiet zone instead of each city its own section. Recently the FRA inspected this quiet zone and found some areas they felt were at risk.

- The concerns in Bluffdale were quickly fixed by our Public Works team, so our section of the railroad is compliant.
- However, other cities had bigger issues that take a little longer to fix. Because the FRA views this area as one, until everything is fixed, the horns will continue to be used at every on-grade crossing, like at Day Ranch Park.
- As of the end of October, one city still had an issue they are working to fix as quickly as possible. Once that has been corrected, a re-inspection with the FRA inspector can be scheduled. The FRA inspector will reinspect all outstanding items and if he finds them to be in compliance, we will be allowed to submit the documentation to reinstate quiet zone status and it will become effective – in other words, no more train horns after that point!

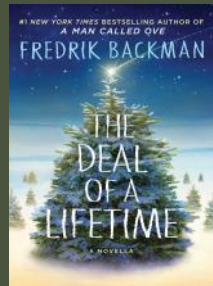
